Russell S. Sobel, Ph.D., is Professor of Economics and holder of the James Clark Coffman Distinguished Chair in Entrepreneurial Studies at West Virginia University. He has published over 150 books and articles, including a collegiate Principles of Economics textbook. Dr. Sobel served as the founding Director of the WVU Entrepreneurship Center from 2002-2006. His research has been featured in the *New York Times*, *Wall Street Journal*, *Washington Post*, *US News and World Report*, and *The Economist Magazine*, as well as appearances on CNBC, Fox News, CSPAN, and the CBS Evening News. He has received numerous awards for both his teaching and research. He serves as Senior Economist and Director of the Center for Economic Growth for the Public Policy Foundation of West Virginia. He received his Ph.D. in Economics from Florida State University in 1994. His edited book on West Virginia economic policy reform, *Unleashing Capitalism: Why Prosperity Stops at the West Virginia Border and How to Fix It*, has sold over 5,000 copies and was named winner of the 2008 Sir Anthony Fisher Award.

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Joshua C. Hall, Ph.D., is an Assistant Professor of Economics & Management at Beloit College in Beloit, Wisconsin. Formerly an economist for the Joint Economic Committee of the U.S. Congress, he authored or co-authored nearly two dozen refereed journal articles and numerous public policy studies for state and local organizations.

Chris W. Bonneau, Ph.D., is an Associate Professor of Political Science at the University of Pittsburgh. The Honorable Wanda G. Bryant, J.D., is an associate judge on the North Carolina Court of Appeals. A first generation college graduate, Judge Bryant received a Bachelor of Arts degree at Duke University in 1977. As an Angier B. Duke scholar, she was chosen to study for a summer at Oxford University, England. She received her Juris Doctor at North Carolina Central University in Durham. Judge Bryant made history when she

was appointed the first female and first African-American prosecutor of the thirteenth prosecutorial district of North Carolina in 1983. From 1987 until 1988 she served as the first staff attorney for the Police Executive Research Forum and in 1989 she became an Assistant United States Attorney in the Office for the District of Columbia. Bryant then served as a Senior Deputy Attorney General in the Office of the North Carolina Attorney General from 1993 to 2001. She was appointed by Governor Mike Easley to the North Carolina Court of Appeals in 2001.

Ronda L. Harvey, J.D., is a partner in the Charleston office and a member of the Litigation Practice Group for Bowles, Rice, McDavid, Graff & Love LLP. Her practice primarily involves representing manufacturers, utility companies, and retailers in deliberate intent actions. The Honorable Sandra Day O'Connor, LL.B., is a retired Associate Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court. She received her B.A. and LL.B. from Stanford University. She served as Deputy County Attorney of San Mateo County, California from 1952–1953 and as a civilian attorney for Quartermaster Market Center, Frankfurt, Germany from 1954–1957. From 1958–1960, she practiced law in Maryvale, Arizona, and served as

Assistant Attorney General of Arizona from 1965–1969. She was appointed to the Arizona State Senate in 1969 and was subsequently reelected to two two-year terms. In 1975 she was elected Judge of the Maricopa County Superior Court and served until 1979, when she was appointed to the Arizona Court of Appeals. President Reagan nominated her as an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, and she took her seat September 25, 1981. Justice O'Connor retired from the Supreme Court on January 31, 2006.

Mark A. Sadd, J.D., received his Bachelor of Arts in 1986 from the University of Virginia and his Doctor of Jurisprudence in 1992 from West Virginia University. He is a member of the Charleston, West Virginia, law firm of Lewis Glasser Casey & Rollins PLLC, where he concentrates his transaction, litigation and appellate practice on real property development, landlord-tenant relationships, title, land use, eminent domain and related areas of the law.
